



### **FORM**

- We make negatives by adding <u>NOT / N'T</u> after the auxiliary verb.
- If there is no auxiliary verb, we add <u>DO / DOES / DID</u>.
  - I haven't seen her for ages.
  - You shouldn't have gone to so much trouble.
  - We don't like big dogs.
  - They didn't want to go out.
- Infinitives and –ing forms can be negative.
  - We decided not to do anything.
  - I like not working.
- When we introduce negative ideas with verbs such as think, believe, suppose, and imagine, we make the first verb negative, not the second.
  - I don't think you're right.
    \*I think you aren't right.



### TYPES OF QUESTIONS

#### **FORM**

#### YES / NO QUESTIONS

- Do you like English?
- Does your sister live in Boston?
- Can his parents speak English?

#### • WH QUESTIONS

- Subject questions:
- Who loves your mom?
- Object questions:
- Who does your mom love?

#### TAG QUESTIONS

You speak Chinese, don't you?

- Move the auxiliary or modal verb to the start of the sentence (inversion).
- The Present and Past Simple Tense have no auxiliary, so you have to add DO / DOES / DID.
- Subject questions don't use auxiliary verbs.

STATEMENT		QUESTION
Everybody is watching.	>	Is everybody watching?
Everybody had been working hard.	>	Had everybody been working hard?
He has been singing.	>	Has he been singing?
English is spoken all over the world.	>	Is English spoken all over the world?
They will have arrived by tonight.	>	Will they have arrived by tonight?
She would have been listening.	>	Would she have been listening?
They live here.	>	Do they live here?
Everybody laughed.	>	Did everybody laugh?
John broke the window.	>	Who broke the window?



## WHAT ARE INDIRECT QUESTIONS?

- An indirect question is a question embedded inside a statement (i.e., a declarative sentence) or another question (i.e., an interrogative sentence).
- An indirect question does not warrant a question mark. Only a direct question does.
- Bear in mind that "if" and "whether" are not always interchangeable. "If" heads a condition. "Whether" doesn't.
- The word order of an indirect question is the same word order as a statement (subject-verb), not a question (verb-subject).

## **FORM**

• In indirect questions, there is no <u>inversion</u> (the word order doesn't change from statements) and no <u>do / does / did</u> auxiliary verb.

**Direct question**: Where is the bank?

question word subject

Indirect question: Could you tell me where the bank is?

question word subject

# YES / NO QUESTIONS

VERB TENSE	DIRECT QUESTION	INDIRECT QUESTION
Present Simple	Is he Spanish?	Could you tell me <u>if he is</u> Spanish?
	Does David live in London?	Could you tell me if David lives in London?
Past Simple	Was he late for the meeting?	Could you tell me <u>if he was</u> late for the meeting?
	Did Amanda call John yesterday?	Could you tell me <u>if Amanda called</u> John yesterday?
Present Continuous	Is the restaurant closing now?	Could you tell me if the restaurant is closing now?
Past Continuous	Were you watching TV at 3pm?	Could you tell me <u>if you were watching TV</u> at 3pm?
Present Perfect	Has Lucy been to Mexico?	Could you tell me <u>if Lucy has been</u> to Mexico?
Past Perfect	Had she found this job when she moved there?	Could you tell me <u>if she had found</u> this job when she moved there?

# WH QUESTIONS

VERB TENSE	DIRECT QUESTION	INDIRECT QUESTION
Present Tense	Why is he unhappy?	I wonder <u>why he is</u> unhappy.
	Where does David live?	I wonder <u>where David lives</u> .
Past Tense	Why was he late for the meeting?	I wonder <u>why he was</u> late for the meeting.
	Why did Amanda call John?	I wonder why Amanda called John.
Present Continuous	When is the restaurant closing?	I wonder when the restaurant is closing.
Past Continuous	What were you doing at 3pm?	I wonder <u>what you were doing</u> at 3pm.
Present Perfect	Where has Lucy been?	I wonder <u>where Lucy has been</u> .
Past Perfect	Why had she quit her job before she moved there?	I wonder <u>why she had quit</u> her job before she moved there.
